

TEMPIO ROOM



MAIN CHARACTERISTICS

Elegant and functional, this room can be divided into two separate spaces for parallel sessions. High quality finishing and furniture throughout the room with soundproof and sound-absorbing beech wood walls and cherry wood floors. Standard, ready to go set up and lay out.

Thonet linking lecture chairs with maximum comfort can be provided. The room is located on the ground floor.

FEATURES:

- Soundproof and sound-absorbing full height beech wood partition walls can divide the room into 2 separate spaces
- Natural light and remote controlled blackout facilities
- Dimmer lights for selected areas
- Standard 2 x 10 m stage with Presidential table and podium
- Stage lighting truss system with stage dimmer lights
- Audio amplification system with wired and radio microphones
- Screen and hanging video projection system for front screen projection in every part of the room
- Fixed hooks for suspended rigging
- Extensive audio, video and lighting connections
- Fixed and mobile video production
- 3 translation booths with simultaneous translation service of up to 8 languages
- High density Wi-Fi coverage
- LCD monitor on both Presidential table and podium
- 2 entrance points to the room
- Customisable digital signage at each entrance to room
- Floor outlets for exhibitions (power supply, sockets)



The origin of the name

The Tempio Room takes its name from the Tempio Malatestiano, one of the most important examples of 15th century Italian heritage. It was commissioned in 1447 by Sigismondo Pandolfo Malatesta as a splendid "pantheon" for his ancestors, his wife, Isotta degli Atti, his refined court and for himself. The fresco by Piero della Francesca offers an extraordinary portrait of the "Prince" of Rimini. The temple was a reconstruction of the ancient church of St. Francis, which in the late 13th century already housed the precious crucifix by Giotto on the main altar. Renaissance sobriety and late Gothic decorative styles complement each other in the architecture designed by Leon Battista Alberti.
